# SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD DOMAIN

In line with the thematic premises and strategies this programmatic domain guides all of our livelihood interventions towards sustainability. For poverty alleviation our livelihood initiatives, focuses in building skills and capacity of the programme participants, boosting income with small and medium scale on farm and off farm enterprises, providing inputs, transferring appropriate technology, equipping with coping and recovery mechanisms from shock/stress, and retaining inputs and assets. All livelihood initiatives contribute to the mission with outcome and impact. Under this domain, we facilitate programmes/projects on savings for capital formation, skills and entrepreneurship development, technology transfer, inclusive finance, micro-finance support, agro-farming, crop diversification, livestock farming, promoting cash crop, micro-enterprise development, agriculture credit, intermediary service development, agro-processing, marketing and value chain development and organizing and grooming women, farmers' producers' and traders' along with their respective organizations.

ACHIEVEMENT

- Around 2736 million BDT has been disbursed around 141 Thousand Members.
- Access to financial resources for local communities has been promoted to undertake income generating initiatives and earn a living for their families.
- Enhance access to essential services for their own and family members.
- Women empowerment has been boosted up in the family and the communities.

HIGHLIGHTS

I affiliated with WAVE Foundation in 2017 and took BDT 24000 as loan to procure electric Swing machine for starting Net's Bag production/business under Jagoron component. After successfully payment once more I took BDT 30 000 to scale up the production. At present I have 8 machines with one paid manpower for the production. My elder son and daughter are studying at class X and Class VIII. Now my total capital is BDT 250000 and monthly gross income BDT 30000.

Chandana Das (39), a citizen of the Nijnanduwali village under Magura Sadar Upazila in Magura distrct ; expressed her success and vision after overcoming his poverty through net bag preparing business with the financial support from WAVE Foundation .





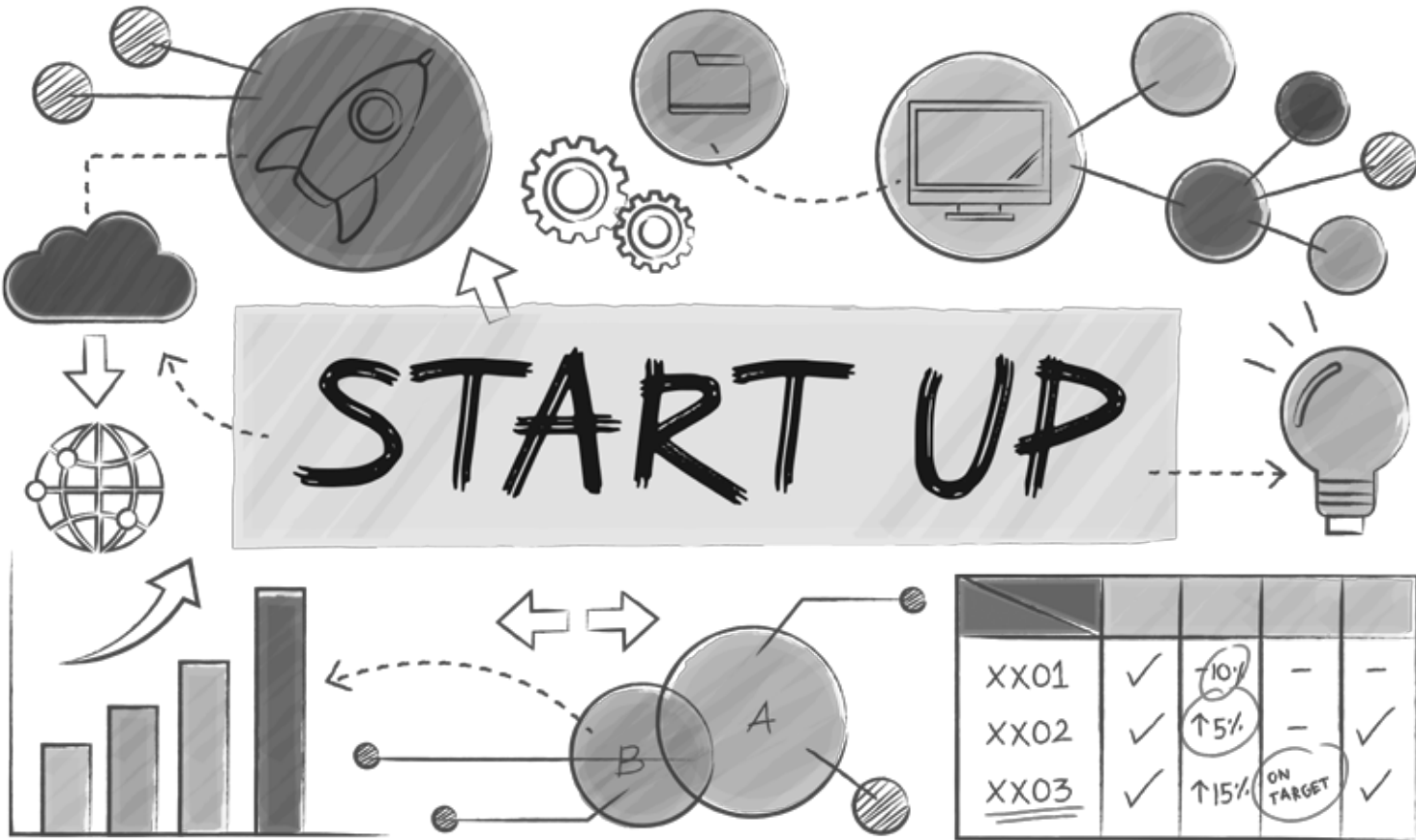
ACHIEVEMENT

- Around 1281 million has been disbursed among around 27,009 Members.
- Created enable opportunity to survive from backlog for covid-19 and boosted up for entrepreneurship among marginalized communities.
- Men and women from disadvantaged section of the society emerged as Potential entrepreneurs with financial and technical support form WAVE.
- Created small-scale employment through different entrepreneur's initiatives.

HIGHLIGHTS

I Started cow fattening with only BDT 30 000 from WAVE Jagoron Component and Recently I took BDT 100000 & expanded my farm. Now I am a small farm owner with 8 bulls. My average monthly income is 20,000-25000.

Ambia Khatun (35), a resident of the Kedargonj village under Alamdanga Upazila in chuadanga district; expressed her gratitude after overcoming poverty through cow fattening with the financial support from WAVE Foundation.



ACHIEVEMENT

- Up scaling the Agricultural and livestock Production through the financial & technical assistance of WAVE Foundation.
- High value crops production has been popularized and becoming in the mainstreaming.
- Use of modern technology in agriculture has expanded which is facilitated by WAVE Foundation.

HIGHLIGHTS

Despite her strong will, Nasima could not study due to poverty. Now being financially self-sufficient, Nasima no longer has to look back. Nasima and her husband participated in a 3-day training on potato cultivation organized by a non-government organization. Later due to high cost of potato cultivation, they faced capital crisis. At that time, Nasima came to know that WAVE Foundation provides loan for such work along with technical support. Later, Nasima joined the Brishti Mahila Samiti of WAVE and started accumulating savings. On May 2016, she took Agrashar Component loan of BDT 70,000. She also bought a calf with some money and started cultivating potatoes with the remaining money. Nasima wishes that one day she will become a successful farmer. She will devote herself to various developmental activities of the society.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- During the dry season, around 1 acre of lands are covered under draught tolerant rice cultivation in Chuadanga District. Different draught tolerant rice variety (BRRI- 43, 57 & 71) has been introduced in the working area.
- 1425 numbers of farmers (95% of the targeted members) continuing production and marketing of year-round Summer Onion (BARI Onion-05). Onion production has been increased upto 33% whereas during this year nearly 300 kg of BARI Onion-05 seeds have been produced.
- Farmers have set up Cost-effective commercial Specialized Storage for summer onion that helps to reduce post-harvest losses (10% -15%) and production cost (25-30%).
- For safe vegetable production, 4 clusters have been developed covering 245 bigha of land.
- 5 Krishi Morcha Groups (Farmers Producer Organization) formed with a total of 125 farmers, having their Savings Account for fund creation.

## HIGHLIGHTS

A community-based collection and marketing center for agricultural products has been set up at Damurhuda Upazila of Chuadanga district with the aim of gaining greater reach through combined marketing via a single sale depot and hence greater control over the quality of the products being sold. The center is currently serving as a one-stop service point for farmers providing input-output market services, grading, sorting and packaging assistance, transportation facilities etc. Every day on an average 800-1000 kg of different types of vegetables worth of BDT 60,000 to 70,000 are being collected and supplied to different markets.





## ACHIEVEMENT

- Open Nucleus Breeding System (ONBS) has been followed to maintain and produce pure breeds of Black Bengal Goat-BBG.
- Semi Intensive Perch (Macha) Method is successfully replicated in 28 Upazilas of 5 Districts of Bangladesh, covering 9,847 beneficiaries. Goat mortality rate reduced significantly from 20% to 10%.
- 54 goat rearing clusters, 170 Black Bengal Buck Service center and a Black Bengal Goat Mart have been developed.
- A total number of 900 micro entrepreneurs have been developed in establishing small and mid-sized sheep breed farms whereas full-time and part-time employment opportunities (wage-based) are created. 10 Garol/Nagpuri rearing clusters and 110 Garol/Nagpuri Buck Service center have been developed.
- A new technique of artificial insemination (AI) of pure Black Bengal Goat breed has been introduced in the working areas. AI technology has been used on a total of 95 goats.

## HIGHLIGHTS

The potential of local improved sheep farming in strengthening the economy of rural population where opportunities are limited and land holdings are small is enormous. Garole is the cross breed of our native sheep with the Nagpuri breed of West Bengal. The popularity of this breed is increasing by virtue of its prolificacy, lambing frequency and disease resistance. At the organizational level, WAVE has established 2 sheep breeding farms. At the beneficiary level, semi-intensive perch method of sheep rearing has been introduced among 990 farmers. Many small holder farmers and unemployed youth have opted for rearing sheep with very low investments, which have transformed into a profitable venture and also been contributing to create employment opportunities and poverty alleviation.



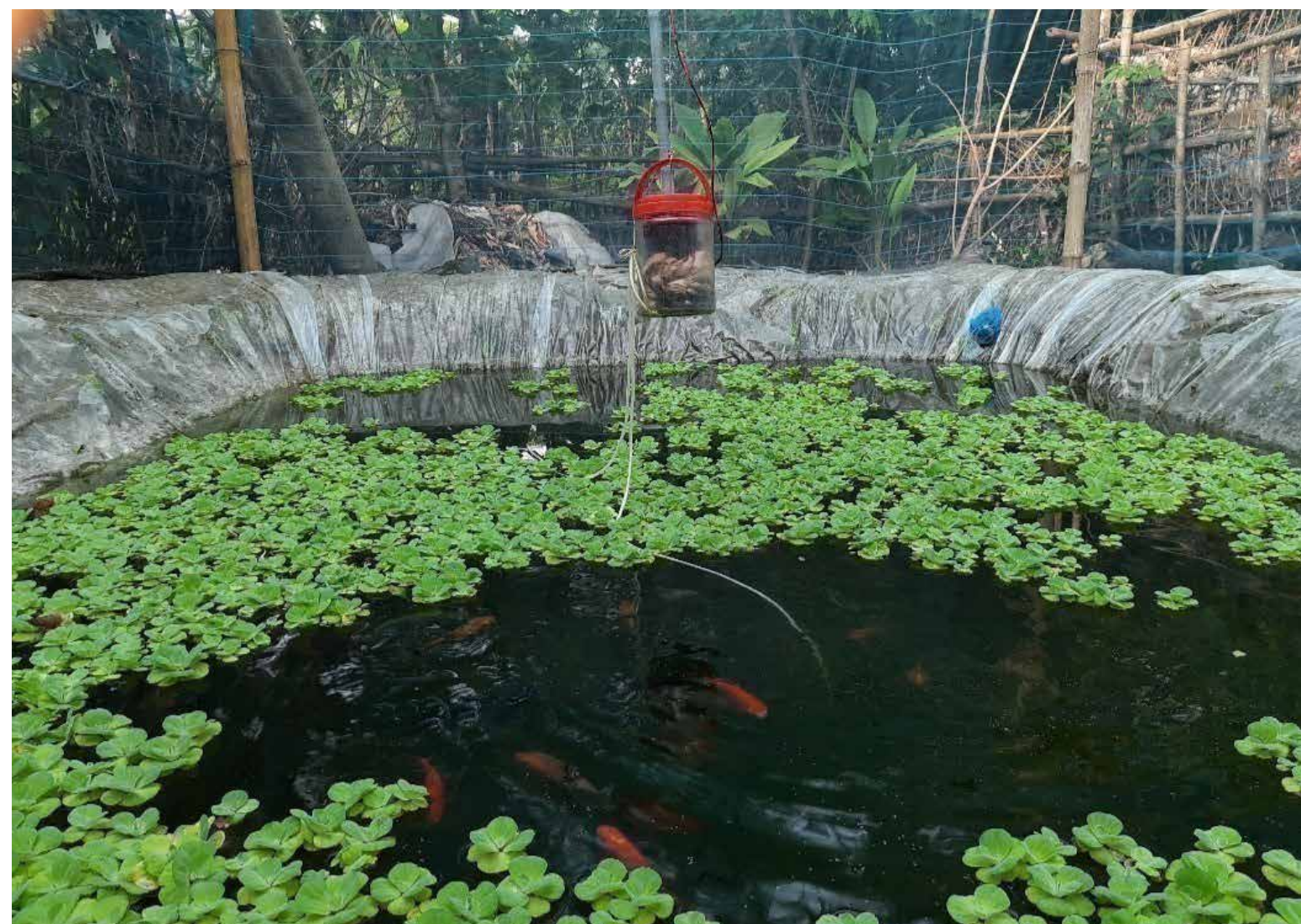


## ACHIEVEMENT

- 10 clusters of High Value Fish culture have been developed.
- High Value fish species such as Shing, Magur, Gulsha and pabda culture have been introduced in the working area.
- The demand of fish culture is increased among the farmers after the technical trainings.
- This year, about 2.0 core BDT (loan disbursement) has been distributed among 700 beneficiaries.

## HIGHLIGHTS

Recirculating Aquaculture Systems (RAS) represent a new way of indoor fish farming. It is possible to rear 1,200 fish per cubic meter in indoor tanks with a controlled environment through this system. In terms of productivity and efficiency, RAS enables fish to grow to commercial size faster compared to other methods and continuous harvest year-round. RAS technique has been introduced by WAVE among 20 fish farmers in Chuadanga district, cultivating various high value fish like Pabda, Gulsha, Shing, Magur in the tank. The advanced filtering capabilities of RAS can significantly reduce water contamination from chemical waste, feed and feces, making it a much more sustainable alternative.





# DEMOCRATIC GOVERNANCE DOMAIN

This domain guides our development initiatives with priorities and strategies in promoting and fostering governance and rights. In line with the thematic premise and strategies we intervene with a two-facet approach. In one facet, we promote democratic decentralization and develop interface between public service institutions and the people at the local level. Similarly, at the local level, we work with local government institutions to enhance the system of governance by promoting participation of people from respective constituencies. Here, social advocacy is another phenomenal task we carry out for protecting rights of specific vulnerable groups and communities who are discriminated or deprived of justice in any particular issue, such as social safety net, products price discrimination, health, education, agriculture services etc. In this juncture, we tend to educate and empower targeted population with the knowledge and examples of democratic norms, practice, accountability, transparency, responsiveness and rule of law. In another facet, we facilitate policy advocacy. In the policy advocacy, we work to peruse people's agenda for review, reformation and enactment of new policy. In the process of policy advocacy, we conduct research, alliance building, networking, campaign and lobbying. We participate in the regional and global advocacy platforms as well. This domain allows us to facilitate responsiveness of public service institutions, responsiveness of LGIs, local governance, democratic decentralization and strong local government, right to food and nutrition, and so on.

Improve quality of people's lives with prior focus on the poor and marginalized by obtaining access to rights and services, promoting institutional responsiveness and democratic practice.

## HIGHLIGHTS

Md. Nekbar Hossain (68) is the President of Goyeshpur Union Loak Morcha at Sreepur, Magura. In April 2020 of COVID-19 outbreak, he initiated to awareness promotion by miking in Goyeshpur. He provided soap, antiseptic, face-mask to the marginalized community and arranged hand-washing system at two mosques. He disseminated the messages on maintaining COVID protocol to protect the pandemic. He also extended his support to work with the Goyeshpur UP Chairman as well as the Union Parishad for ensuring quarantine for respected people from other districts.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Gradually 13760 participants are being covered for receiving services on agriculture, pure drinking water and social safety net at Sreepur and Mohammadpur Upazilas in Magura District.
- The People's Alliance Loak Morcha (LM) supported UP representatives in organizing 72 participatory Ward Sava and 17 open budgets in the working area.
- About 1000 civil society representatives are capacitated to identify local level problems, causes, major stakeholders and developed action plan.
- Developed transparency and accountability of UP and service delivery institutions through social audit conducted by Loak Morcha.

## HIGHLIGHTS

"As a helpless one I could not imagine that through village court, I would easily regain control of my land. Village court is the court of the poor, I say everyone to go there without going to the police station or formal court for the petty dispute".

Shamsul Haque (40), a physically challenged citizen of the Boro Auliapur village under Auliapur union of Patuakhali Sadar Upazila; expressed his hope after getting remedy through Village Court.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Village court emerged as door step judiciary service for the villagers.
- Around 15646 cases were resolved and 21922 people got counselling service.
- Approximately 31292 families are benefited through village court service.
- A total of 491536 people are reached through court yard meeting, rally, community sharing meeting, tea stall session and outreach activities.

This domain is the umbrella of all social programs and projects. In line with the thematic premises it provides us with strategic directions for innovating, designing, implementing and monitoring the social development programs and projects. Under this domain we facilitate programs/projects on education, health, social development and climate resilience, social protection, violence against women, access to justice, peace building, social cohesion, inclusion of excluded population, disability and development, elderly people, women and youth leadership development and many more. We also prioritize empowering the youth with leadership capabilities, life skills and with occupational skills. All programs and projects maintain functional relation with the overarching social development domain for reaching WAVE's mission.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Around 9400 families received year-round health services by the Health Officers through 9393 Health Cards. Around 18000 and 14000 people received health services through 1686 static clinics and 404 village level satellite clinics under ENRICH.
- 176 ENRICH Education Centers helped to reduce drop-out rate and ensured 100% enrolment in Government Primary School in ENRICH areas providing Pre-primary & school supportive education and co-curricular activities.
- 26 Enrich Household generated income as well as met daily family nutrition need utilizing their homestead land.
- A significant number of beggars are rehabilitated and going to be self-dependent by undertaken different IGAs.
- Elders' committee successfully lobbied to manage old age allowance for 400 poor elderly people and more than 900 distressed senior citizens got blankets to prevent cold wave in winter.
- A total of 66 adolescent club & 55 school forums are capacitated through leadership & career development, menstrual & mental health management training. They are dealing with and contributing in different community issues with the assistance of local administration, LG representatives and law enforce agency.
- 54 Community Groups (CGs) & 21 Loakmorchas undertook social advocacy with LG & GoB Service Delivery Institutions and made them responsive towards pro-people services and issues i.e health, education, preventing violence against women, UPs open and participatory budget, ensuring fair price for farmers, COVID-19 response and so on.



"Marginal farmer Razzaque (53) lost everything for his right leg treatment, became disable and choosing begging to lead five members family. As a beggar, once he has been selected for rehabilitation under ENRICH program. He got assets BDT.100000/- . His family utilized those assets with restless effort for generating regular income. They become owner of 02 cows; 02 breeding bucks; 04 does; 20 ducks; 30 pigeons; 12 decimal purchased land; and 17 decimal cultivable land. Now, his average net monthly income is BDT-7000.

Finally, farmers sold their paddy by fair price in GoB Food Stores.

## HIGHLIGHTS

Amid the coronavirus outbreak, network raised 7 points demands for marginalized people including farmer's live & livelihood. It has been demanded to ensure loan support for marginal farmers and pure tenants under the stimulus package after necessary scrutiny and considering their capacity instead of 'Written Agreement'. Significant media attentions helped the policy makers for taking proper steps to deal the situation.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Right to Food & Nutrition Campaign helped to transform discussion of food security into right to food.
- More than one thousand local, national and international NGOs/networks and individuals from all over the country joined the Right to Food & Nutrition movement.
- Good liaison established with a number of influential policy makers, respective ministries, government officials, bi-lateral & multilateral organizations and development partners.
- In 2020, 'National Food and Nutrition Security Policy-NFNSP' has been formulated by the government as a result of the relentless campaign and policy advocacy efforts.

- The network is on its track to approach the draft proposal of Right to Food Act the Ministry of Food as well as other concerned authorities.
- Food assistance provided under social safety net program and other programs by the government is often considered as a charity, however gradually the concept of Food is being establishing as a right, not charity. RfF BD is constantly pursuing government to acknowledge Right to Food as a Human Right as part of this policy.



# RENEWABLE ENERGY

## HIGHLIGHTS

Solar Irrigation project (SIP) is contributing to the national grid and climate change impact, reduce dependency on fossil fuel and demand for electricity from the national grid for irrigation in agriculture field. This project has already been able to contribute approximately 3.2 Mega Watt electricity generations to the national power from 74 numbers of SIP. The project reduced approximately 9.25 lac liters of diesel use, which saves millions of foreign currencies and also has reduces 2.5 million kg carbon emission per year.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Biogas project provides access to modern environment friendly safe cooking fuel. Use of Biogas protected women and children from indoor air pollution and related diseases.

- Access to solar electricity upgraded the living standards of people in rural areas.
- The program improves rural infrastructure and diversifies rural income streams.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- The Platform 'Youth Assembly' reached around 1 million people including marginalized community through online and offline Campaign 'Youth Against COVID-19'.
- Community people received support by Social Action Project-SAPs implemented by the Active Citizens leaders. Youth leader participated in International Study Visit-ISV in UK and exchanged experience locally implemented SAPs in different contexts around the globe. A number of SAPs implemented using social media (Project We, Hi-men, etc.) engaging Youth Assembly.
- Participants are invited and welcomed by different social organizations as volunteers to support on English speaking skills. Two of the SAP name Wings of Phoenix and F.ear are continuing their journey. Wings of Phoenix turned the SAP into Social Enterprise.
- 63 youth committees are functioning to bring positive change to the society and contributed to reduce drug addiction, child marriage, and eve teasing etc. Annual sports and cultural events have been arranged with 500 youths. It is playing a significant role to build a drug free society.



## ACHIEVEMENT

- The youth participants are provided skills on specific trade courses and linked with IGA. They are contributing in family and dealing with different social issues participating in decision making process.
- Youth are capacitated through soft & hard skill training and linked with enterprises and job market. A total of 4 youth organizations are formed out of the project interventions and got registration from DYD (Department of youth Development). Youth leaders established 2 youth Hubs in project areas.
- Norec International Exchange Program promote the collaboration and issue-based knowledge exchange between Bangladesh and India that contributed in SDGs goal 1, 2, 8, and 17. An article is published in international journal by Norec professional.

## HIGHLIGHTS

Some boys and girls of 18 to 29 from the village of Varpasha changed the path of their destiny when they thought of setting up a Youth Hub. The Youth Hub is aimed at developing youth as active citizens, their leadership skills, and sustaining youth activities. The youth hub is being operated through an apex body which has 20 members. All the apex body members of the youth hub are trained under soft skills training. According to the decisions made in the apex body and co- creation meeting at different layers, the youth hub rented a place near Krishnakathi 1no. Ward Primary School. The place has three rooms which are respectively for tailoring, IT service and tea stall. The EYW project provided the rent for two years of the place. The youth members are planning to conduct a variety of income-generating activities and social initiatives centering this hub. Now Swapno Choa Youth Hub in collaboration with their community and local authorities is flying high to touch their dreams. They are determined, 'We will be fighting against poverty hand in hand and succeed'.

## ACHIEVEMENT

- Enhanced the skills & knowledge of 59 migrated households about practicing scientific method on goat rearing and adaptive perch method.
- Migrated Participants are also undertaking alternative income generating activities (IGA) i.e. small business, fodder cultivation, vermin compost, hen rearing etc.
- The income of 40% targeted migrated households has been increased and 15 families are planning to establish themselves as an entrepreneur.
- Income of 80% migrated households has been increased by 50% from goat breeding.

## HIGHLIGHTS

Nazma Begum (49) is a poor housewife & climate migrant. 22 years ago, her family migrated from Barisal to Rayermahal slum in Khulna city due to river erosion. She got married with a day laborer at her early age. Since then, her struggle is started. At that time, she received two does and a goat shed support as well as technical training on perch method. At present, Nazma owns 6 goats in her farm that worth BDT 39000. She also rears duck, chicken and pigeons for additional income. Thus, she became self-reliant instead of being dependent on her husband's income. She aspires to establish a small goat farm in near future.





## NETWORK AND ALLIANCE FACILITATED BY WAVE FOUNDATION



People's Alliance (LoakMorchha-LM) is a non-partisan and non-communal social organization associated with the representatives from different strata of society. Constituencies of LoakMorchha include leaders of civil society, volunteers, youths, self-motivated women and men, representatives of locally elected bodies, leaders of NGO beneficiary groups, NGO representatives and representatives of different professional associations. It is developed as a voluntary social organization in the grass root level aiming at strengthening local government, effective public service delivery and to mobilize public opinion against human rights violation. With the initiative of WAVE Foundation, GC facilitated the formation of 145 LoakMorchha and it exists at three local administrative tiers (in UP, Upazilla and District) of the program area since 2004 to February 2011. Later, the LoakMorchha of Chuadanga district are continuing their proactive role with the technical guidance of WAVE Foundation. More than 5000 male and female members were pro-actively involved under the banner of People's Alliance (Loak Morchha) in as grass-roots civil society organizations at the Union, Upazila and District level through different governance and local government focused projects and campaigns. They were engaged in civic movement for pursuing people's issues to the public service providers, local government representatives and local administrations.



Governance Advocacy Forum (GAF) is a national level platform that aims to promote democratic decentralization and local self-government through campaign and policy advocacy. GAF founded in 2007 undertaking policy advocacy for promoting strong local government. At present, the forum consists of 36 national and international NGOs, networks, local government platforms, institutions and civil society representatives working towards democratic decentralization and local self-government in Bangladesh.

At present, more than thousand national and local level organizations are engaged with this network.

# SKILL AND INNOVATION HUB



## CENTRE FOR DEVELOPMENT & CAPACITY-CDC

WAVE has been conducting Action Research for improving the quality and productivity of its products and promoting innovative ideas. To achieve this, WAVE has been working on Black Bengal Goat Breeding farm, fish culture, rice seed processing and other innovations in its own campus situated in Koshaghata village near Chuadanga district town. Besides, the program participants are provided with skills development training in the campus. In 2010, the campus was named as Center for Development and Capacity-CDC. Organization is developing enterprises in the aim of sustainability of its programs. At the same time, organization is operating on firm training center in CDC.

## WAVE TRAINING CENTER

To develop human resources including staff, partners, beneficiaries and other stakeholders, WAVE Foundation has incorporated training as an integral part of all programs. It has its own training centre in Chuadanga equipped with all the necessary and modern supports including accommodation facility. Through the training centre, WAVE also offers various need-based training courses for other NGOs and non-project participants.

## WAVE TRADE TRAINING CENTER

This vocational Institute in Darshana, Chuadanga has been providing vocational trainings to youths from July 2018. The objective of the training is to provide financial development and technical services so they can earn a living.

## ANKUR CRAFTS

Support poor people specially women in establishing themselves as small entrepreneur and self-reliant through building market linkage of their products especially crafting and clothing.

## ANKUR SEEDS

ANKUR Seeds is an initiative dedicated to the sustainable development of agricultural sector through ensuring available production, efficient processing and planned marketing of quality Crop Seeds to meet the Farmer's demand. ANKUR is brand name of our seed which is registered under the government authority. The initiative has been started since 2009 by WAVE Foundation. ANKUR Seeds has developed the capacity of farmers introducing new technologies, produced and marketed three high-yielding varieties of Rice (BR 26, BRRI dhan 28 and BRRI dhan 50) with remarkable success. It has also done the processing and marketing of high-yielding Variety of Wheat (PRODIP). It intends to become the most trusted source of quality seeds of Boro as well as Aman and Aush Rice, Wheat, Oil Seeds, Vegetables and Tissue Culture of Potato Seeds. 5100 farmers are currently producing rice seed and about 65 metric tons of Rice and Wheat seeds are marketed by ANKUR each year.

## ANKUR AGRO MACHINERIES

Angkur Agro Machineries is an enterprise of WAVE Foundation that aims at complementing WAVE's commitment towards the development of agriculture sector. It offers a wide range of agro machineries to the farmers- Power Tiller, Thresher, Chopper, Reaper, Harvester, Shallow Pump, Sprayer and so on at an affordable price.

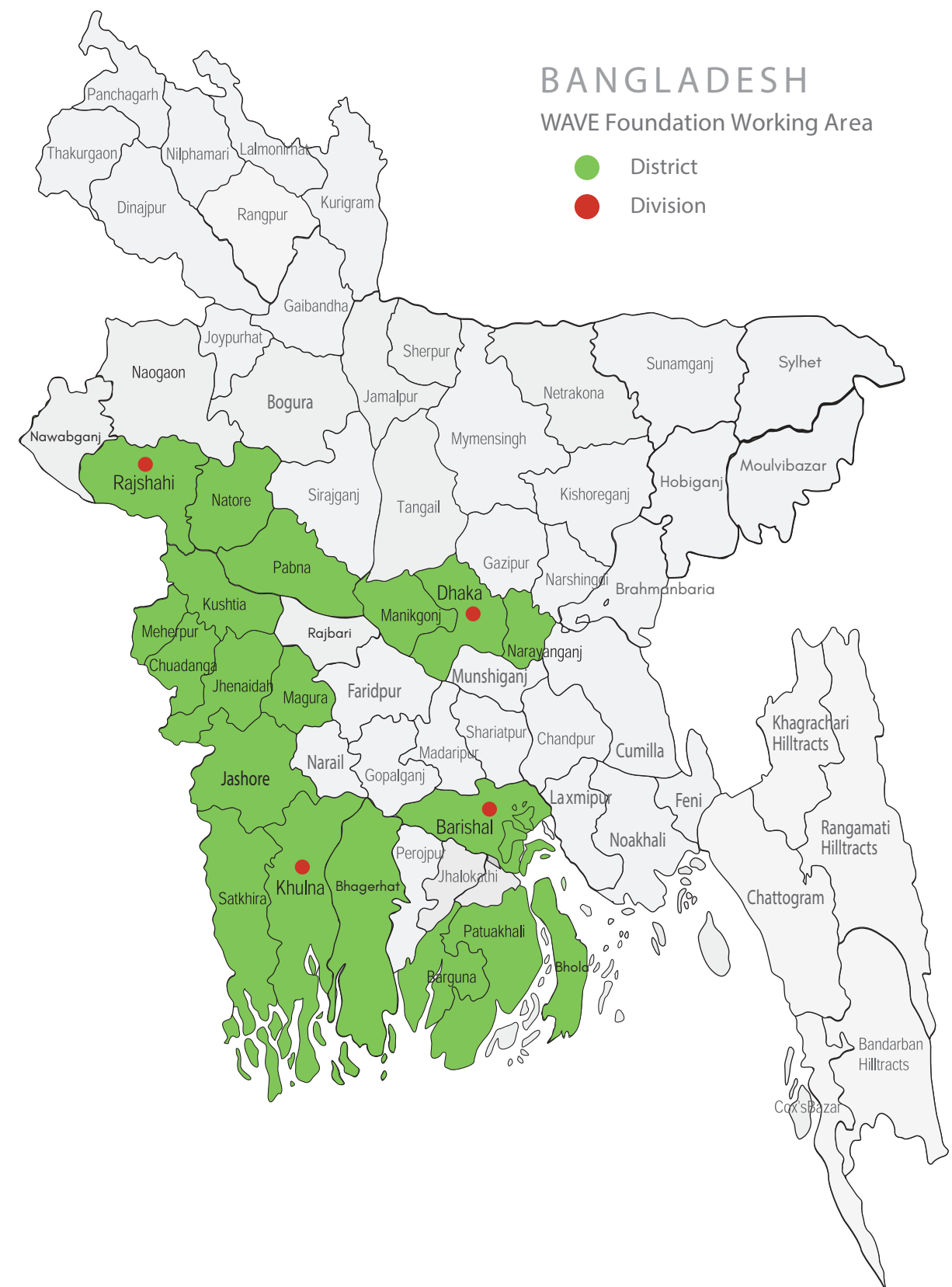

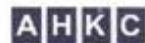
