# SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOOD

In line with the thematic premises and strategies this programmatic domain guides all of our livelihood interventions towards sustainability. For poverty alleviation our livelihood initiatives, focuses in building skills and capacity of the program participants, boosting income with small and medium scale on farm and off farm enterprises, providing inputs, transferring appropriate technology, equipping with coping and recovery mechanisms from shock/stress, and retaining inputs and assets. All livelihood initiatives contribute to the mission with outcome and impact. Under this domain, we facilitate programs/projects on savings for capital formation, skills and entrepreneurship development, technology transfer, inclusive finance, micro-finance support, agro-farming, crop diversification, livestock farming, promoting cash crop, micro-enterprise development, agriculture credit, intermediary service development, agro-processing, marketing and value chain development and organizing and grooming women, farmers, producers and traders along with their respective organizations.



- Cultivated drought tolerant rice variety around **500 acres** of land in Chuadanga, Meherpur and Kushtia District in the Aus and Aman season.
- Involved around **4,500 farmers** in summer onion cultivation in Chuadanga, Meherpur, Kushtia and Rajshahi district.
- Produced safe vegetable in 7 clusters covering 99 Acres of land in Chuadanga and Manikgonj Districts.
- Involved around **75 farmers** in **2 clusters** for summer watermelon cultivation in Chuadanga District covering around **33 Acres** of land.
- Established 01 agricultural buying and selling center, 01 safe crop sales center and 01 agricultural hub in Chuadanga, Manikganj and Rajshahi District, respectively.



#### **LIVESTOCK**

#### **KEY ACHIEVEMENTS**

- Increased goat production around 265.00%, decreased goat mortality rate from 16.83% to 4.0% and significantly increased annual income of the farmers through goat and sheep rearing.
- Started castrated goats rearing in the Chuadanga, Meherpur and Kushtia District for fattening purposes and farmers make a significant amount of profit.
- Established linkages between goat farmers of Meherpur and Chuadanga districts with private company and farmers are getting profit by selling goats on live weight basis.
- Introduced a new breed of chicken, namely Color Broiler (BAU-Bro) and Pakin duck in Chuadanga district and community people were familiar with this breed.

• Established Dumba breeding farm in Chuadanga and Locally Improved Sheep Breeding farm in Meherpur.

#### **FISHERIES**

**KEY ACHIEVEMENTS** 



- Developed High Value Fish clusters (Mola, Shing, Magur, Gulsha, Chital, Aier, Shol and Pabda) in Chuadanga district.
- Demonstrated 04 Nursery Pond culture clusters and 5 Carp Fattening clusters in the Chuadanga District.
- Emerged **100** youths as fish farming entrepreneurs using new fish culture technologies such as RAS (Recirculating aquaculture system) and Bio-flock fish culture method.
- Cultivated vegetables using pond banks by the fish farmers and they earned extra income from vegetable farming.
- Established a High Value Local Varity Mixed Fish Hatchery.

During 2021-2022 financial year as a part of gradual transformation of the existing agrifood system WAVE Foundation primarily focuses on protecting small-scale Family Farming, Women and Youth Agripreneurs by conserving nature, biodiversity and indigenous knowledge, facilitating local, national and regional social cohesion and movement. It also underpins modern innovations and environment friendly technologies and promotes climate resilient agriculture to address ecological crisis and climate change. WAVE has already started practicing the agriculture based on the principles of agroecology and incorporated transformative actions in existing agrifood system.

# **GOVERNANCE & RIGHTS**

This domain guides our development initiatives with priorities and strategies in promoting and fostering governance and rights. In line with the thematic premise and strategies we intervene with a two-faceted approach. In one facet, we promote democratic decentralization and develop interface between public service institutions and the people at the local level. Similarly, at the local level, we work with local government institutions to enhance the system of governance by promoting participation of people from respective constituencies. Here, social advocacy is another phenomenal task we carry out for protecting rights of specific vulnerable groups and communities who are discriminated or deprived of justice in any particular issue, such as social safety net, products price discrimination, health, education, agriculture services etc. In this juncture, we tend to educate and empower targeted population with the knowledge and examples of democratic norms, practice, accountability, transparency, responsiveness and rule of law. In another facet, we facilitate policy advocacy. In the policy advocacy, we work to peruse people's agenda for review, reformation and enactment of new policy. In the process of policy advocacy, we conduct research, alliance building, networking, campaign and lobbing. We participate in the regional and global advocacy platforms as well. This domain allows us to facilitate responsiveness of public service institutions, responsiveness of LGIs, local governance, democratic decentralization and strong local government, right to food and nutrition, women rights and gender equality, and so on.

- 2500 community-based organizations (CBO) were formed in 100 Unions of Rajshahi Division to identify community problems and 73 Upazila level Advocacy Network Committees (ANC) were formed where 1825 potential members were included for raising community issues to the relevant service providers under ELMC project. In the meantime, 3 families from Dalit and Adivasi communities in Satkhira got an allocation of dwelling places under Ashrayan Project of government.
- About 37 local government institutions and officials are accountably, transparently and responsively
  delivering the services of SPPs and 950 civil society actors are actively participating in monitoring SPPs
  for increased public sector accountability and transparency.
- EOL project successfully completed piloting of Citizen Led Assessment (CLA) with 100 households and subsequently it has scaled-up with 1700 household.
- Through the Response project, in 16 Unions of Sreepur and Mohammadpur, Magura, a total of 12987 poor, marginalized and vulnerable citizens especially women have received services under social security programs (6342), agriculture (2999) and safe drinking water (3646). Besides, respective 3 relevant institutions are capacitated to respond to citizen demand.
- Strengthened resilience of marginalized populations (especially Adivasi, extreme poor, poor women) in Chuadanga and 30 No. Ward of DNCC to pandemic and other emergencies through different health and hygiene practices viz. wearing mask, regular hand washing, maintain social distancing and isolation from COVID patients, etc. Moreover, accelerated accountability and transparency of health service providers through voice raising of community people and regular interventions (lobby, advocacy, dialogue and public hearing) of Loak Morcha.

There is no alternative to strengthen the Local Government Institutions (LGIs) and to ensure proper implementation of development activities as well as public participation, transparency and accountability in all sectors. In line with that realization, Governance Advocacy Forum (GAF) organized the "Effective Local Government National Convention 2021" in collaboration with MJF, UKAID and TAF, at Dhaka on December 19, 2021. The convention was graced with the presence of Mr. Md. Tajul Islam MP, Minister, Ministry of Local Government, Rural Development & Co-operatives (LGRD&C) as the Chief Guest and Chaired by Dr. Qazi Kholiquzzaman Ahmad, Chairperson, GAF and Chairman, Palli Karma-Sahayak Foundation (PKSF). The convention provided an opportunity to offer the necessary 11 recommendations for policy reformation to maintain proper synchronicity between the national and local governments as well as to ensure the localization of SDGs, accountability, participation, and resource mobilization. The recommendations were presented by Mr. Mohsin Ali, Coordinator, GAF and Executive Director, WAVE Foundation. The convention was a success with the active participation of more than 800 local government representatives, policy-makers, researchers, social activists, representatives from different organizations, and male-female-transgender-youth representatives.

#### **KEY ACHIEVEMENTS**

- Right to Food & Nutrition issues are made visible and popular that helped to guide the debate from food security to right to food. Beside this, food assistance provided under social safety net program and other programs by the government is often considered as a charity. This line of thoughts has been changing gradually to the concept that Food is a right, not charity.
- Established good liaison with a number of influential policy makers, respective ministries, government officials, bilateral and multilateral organizations and development partners.
- National Food and Nutrition Security Policy-NFNSP has been formulated by the government that we consider as a result of network's relentless campaign and policy advocacy efforts. Besides, RtF BD is constantly pursuing government to acknowledge Right to Food as a Human Right as part of this policy.
- The proposed Right to Food Act has been drafted.

- A total of 44690 patients got door step health services round the year through 401 satellite clinics, 29 health camps and also 2059 static clinics including 85 poor eye patients got free eye cataract operation services by eye specialist surgeon those who are so happy to get their vision in parallel to the health services, 5511 students received pre-schooling and supportive education round the year as well consequently dropout rate is decreasing & secured brilliant result in GoB primary school.
- 647 elderly people got old age allowance in BDT.500 monthly so that stay them in healthy by buying regular medicine as well as meet their daily necessity. Beyond, 08 unemployed poor elderly people running tea stall (namely golden tea-stall) by selling relevant commodities as well have got a new life by getting capital to start a Golden Tea-Stall.
- Enhanced leadership skills of **920 team leaders** of adolescent girls and boys club through receiving leadership training; they play a pivot role to undertake social initiative and run **92** club based Community Library where they enjoy reading and learning at leisure time.
- As a good initiative of Loakmorcha, Singair Upazila received Delivery Equipment from Union Parishad
  for conducting normal delivery at union based health and family welfare center and another Union
  Parishad provided chairs to 02 community clinics as well in both Upazilas, the LG & Public Service
  Providing Agencies are more responsive towards pro-people services.
- A formal evaluation (class one exam in 1st 6 months) process has been completed through close supervision of a committee in consist of 02 GoB officials and District Program Manager headed by Assistant Director-DBNFE where all i.e. 3499 enrolled learners participated and all of them passed successfully by securing 80% plus average marks of 04 subjects under Chuadanga Sadar and Alamdanga upazilas in Chuadanga district.

"Her smile makes us feel blessed", said Towa's mother. Towa, one year old girl from a poor family in a remote village of Chuadanga District was born hale and hearty. Gradually, her parents noticed urinary changes as she ages. In fear of social shame, they did not share this fact to anyone or consult a doctor. Meanwhile, Towa's father came across Ward Committee and Youth Forum under WAVE Facilitated ENRICH program. The orientation on different services under ENRICH health components helped him to speak up on Towa's health issue. He consulted with respective doctor who consoled him on Towa's recovery that could be possible through a simple surgery. Afterwards, ENRICH Youth Forum collected donation from community as Towa's family was not able to afford the treatment cost. Finally, after a successful surgery Towa got back to her normal life. Her parents are glad to this transformation and encourage community to deal with any sensitive health issues rather than concealing it.

The actions eventually benefit their very own local communities and have significant impact in both Bangladesh and the world.

- Solar Irrigation System (SIP) intends to provide irrigation facility to rural off-grid areas, which is reducing dependency on fossil fuel and demand for electricity from national grid by providing cheaper irrigation service compared to diesel-based pumps.
- Made a positive impact on climate change, produced green energy production up to 3.4 MW, provided reliable irrigation for sustainable agriculture and made financial benefits for the marginal farmers.
- Solar irrigation systems save 12,500 Liters of diesel and about 34,000 Kg CO₂ emissions are reduced per year. A total of 2.82 Million Kg CO₂ emissions were reduced by 83 solar irrigation pumps in every year which ensure a healthy and clean environment.
- Biogas plant provides access to modern environment friendly safe cooking fuel. Protect women and children from indoor air pollution and related diseases by contributing to the expansion of agriculture production through using bio-fertilizer.
- Improved Cooking Stove (ICS) to reduce fuel consumption leading to save in firewood up to 50% which protect green environment and deforestation. It also reduces the GHG emission and protects women and children from indoor air pollution.

#### HIGHLIGHTS

Abdus Sattar from Keshobpur Village of Chuadanga District lost his right hand at the age of 28 during repairing a power tiller. This unexpected incident made his life miserable as he was only earning member of his family. In 2019, he came to know about a solar irrigation pump installed by WAVE Foundation nearby his locality. The pump required an operator. He met WAVE personal and finally was hired as pump operator. This job helps him to find a consistent income source and secures his family needs. Likewise Sattar, WAVE renewable energy program has been creating employment opportunities and income source for many people in the respective working areas.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

WAVE Foundation has been working for building a strong climate-resilient community in Bangladesh for a long time. Towards this end, women and youths are engaged in building their capacities to respond to disasters and risk reduction through multifaceted interventions. WAVE has successfully facilitated youth leaders to advocate for making provisions for youth representatives in the local Disaster Management Committees (Ward, Union, Upazila and District) and ensure the effectiveness of the committees according to the Standard Orders on Disaster (SOD) 2019.

Right to Food Bangladesh-RtF BD is an Umbrella Network of CSOs, NGOs, INGOs, networks, peasant's organizations, women organizations, indigenous organizations, social movements, researchers, academia, trade unionist, youth, small-holder farmers, and other part of the society works towards ensuring right to food and nutritional security for all the people of the country. RtF BD is conducting Right to Food & Nutrition Campaign and undertaking multifaceted activities to accelerate the 'Legal Framework on Right to Food' and other relevant issues by engaging different entities with its perspectives and strategies. At present, more than thousand national and local level organizations are engaged with this network.



Governance Advocacy Forum (GAF) is a national level platform that aims to promote democratic decentralization and local self-government through campaign and policy advocacy. GAF founded in 2007 undertaking policy advocacy for promoting strong local government. At present, the forum consists of 36 national and international NGOs, networks, local government platforms, institutions and civil society representatives working towards democratic decentralization and local self-government in Bangladesh.



People's Alliance (LoakMorcha-LM) is a non-partisan and non-communal social organization associated with the representatives from different strata of society. Constituencies of LoakMorcha include leaders of civil society, volunteers, youths, selfmotivated women and men, representatives of locally elected bodies, leaders of NGO beneficiary groups, NGO representatives and representatives of different professional associations. It is developed as a voluntary social organization in the grass root level aiming at strengthening local government, effective public service delivery and to mobilize public opinion against human rights violation. With the initiative of WAVE Foundation, GC facilitated the formation of 145 LoakMorcha and it exists at three local administrative tiers (in UP, Upazila and District) of the program area since 2004 to February 2011. Later, the LoakMorcha of Chuadanga district are continuing their proactive role with the technical guidance of WAVE Foundation. More than 5000 male and female members were pro-actively involved under the banner of People's Alliance (Loak Morcha) in as grass-roots civil society organizations at the Union, Upazila and District level through different governance and local government focused projects and campaigns. They were engaged in civic movement for pursuing people's issues to the public service providers, local government representatives and local administrations.



An international alliance dedicated to strengthening citizen action and civil society around the world. It focuses on three priority areas which are: i) protecting the rights of civil society; ii) Strengthening civil society good practices and iii) Increasing the influence of civil society. WAVE is a voting member of CIVICUS.



The Global Network of Civil Society Organisations for Disaster Reduction (GNDR) is the largest international network of organisations committed to working together to improve the lives of people affected by disasters worldwide. As Full Member of GNDR, WAVE demonstrates as an active civil society organisation and committed at an organisational level to being a part of the GNDR network.



An international platform gathers and mobilizes youth across the globe to work and learn from one another in the hope of realizing peace, envisions the unity among youth that transcends boundaries, races and religions.

WAVE has been conducting Action Research for improving the quality and productivity of its products and promoting innovative ideas. To achieve this, the organization has been working on livestock, fisheries and agriculture components and other innovations in its own center situated in Koshaghata village near Chuadanga district. Besides, the program participants are provided with skills development training in this campus.





#### **WAVE TRAINING CENTER. CHUADANGA**

To develop human resources including staff, partners, beneficiaries and other stakeholders, WAVE Foundation has incorporated training as an integral part of all programs. It has its own training centers in Chuadanga equipped with all the necessary and modern supports including accommodation facility. Through the training centers, WAVE also offers various need-based training courses for other NGOs and non-project participants. WAVE has deployed appropriate, qualified and professional training staff in the centre. Apart from this, WAVE has a pool of resource persons to conduct various training sessions. Senior Management Team Members, Program/Project Coordinators and Deputy Program/Project Coordinators of various programs/projects, Head of Finance & Administration,

Head of Internal Audit, Head of Monitoring Division, etc. of WAVE belong to the pool of resource Persons. Some external reputed persons of various organizations and local government expert individuals also belong to the pool of resource persons who conduct various training sessions on need basis. Besides, Deputy Commissioners, Additional Deputy Commissions (both General & Revenue), Deputy Directors of Local Government (DDLG), Upazila Nirbahi Officers and Upazila level Departmental Heads (Health, Agriculture, Education, etc.) are also invited as Guest Facilitators for the relevant sessions.



#### TRADE TRAINING CENTER, CHUADANGA AND RAISHAHI

This center has been providing vocational trainings to youths. The objective of the training is to provide technical services and financial development so they can earn a living.



#### WAVE SHEEP FARM, MEHERPUR AND PATUAKHALI

To ensure food security and selfemployment of the poor and the hardcore poor, WAVE established sheep farm in Meherpur and Patuakhali districts from 2015 and 2017 respectively. The objectives of this farm are to conduct necessary adaptive research to make the sheep rearing profitable; conserve the genetic purity of local improved and cross-breed sheep and expand the verities to the community level.



### **ANGKUR CRAFTS**

Support poor people specially women in establishing themselves as small entrepreneur and self-reliant through building market linkage of their products especially crafting and clothing.



# **ANGKUR AGRO MACHINERIES**

Extending affordable agro machineries to the farmers is the single most prerequisite to take a leap from manual to mechanization of our agriculture which can radically increase the gross agricultural production. Angkur Agro Machineries is an enterprise of WAVE Foundation that aims at complementing WAVE's commitment towards the development of agriculture sector. It offers a wide range of agro machineries to the farmers-Power Tiller, Thresher, Chopper, Reaper, Harvester, Shallow Pump, Sprayer and so on at an affordable price.



# **ANGKUR SEEDS**

Quality seed is the precondition for bumper agricultural production. But apart from being an agricultural country, it uses approx. 30% quality seeds in agricultural production while the rest of the 70% seeds are below standard which have negative impact on our gross agricultural production. ANGKUR Seeds is an initiative dedicated to the sustainable development of agricultural sector through ensuring available production, efficient processing and planned marketing of quality crop seeds to meet the farmers' demand. ANGKUR is the brand name of our seed which is registered under the government authority. The initiative has been started since 2009 by WAVE Foundation. ANGKUR Seeds has developed the capacity of farmers introducing new technologies, produced and marketed three high-yielding varieties of Rice (BR 26, BRRI Dhan 28 and BRRI Dhan 50) with remarkable success. It has also done the processing and marketing of high-yielding varity of wheat (PRODIP). It intends to become the most trusted source of quality seeds of Boro as well as Aman and Aush rice, wheat, oil seeds, vegetables and tissue culture of potato seeds. 5100 farmers are currently producing rice seed and about 65 metric tons of rice and wheat seeds are marketed by ANGKUR each year.



SMT plays vital roles in decision-making, policy-reviewing, evaluation, corrections and making new policy proposals. Apart from that SMT explores new horizons and works as a bridge between the organization and donors. All officials functional in the directorial posts along with the Executive Director are the members of SMT. Executive Director Coordinates the Senior Management Team.

#### **CENTRAL COORDINATION TEAM (CCT)**

CCT is formed with senior management staff/ program heads/divisional heads and they have regular quarterly meeting coordinated by the Executive Director. CCT is the highest forum and all sorts of organizational level policy formulation, policy reforms, etc. are proposed through these CCT meetings.


