As a development organization, WAVE Foundation is carrying out a multifaceted action plan to establish a society that is poverty-free and built on equality to overcome challenges that prevail in poverty eradication and livelihood development. Therefore, WAVE Foundation is following a holistic, multidimensional, and equitable process as part of sustainable and resilient livelihood development. All projects and initiatives are undertaken with greater emphasis on economic growth and empowerment of the extremely poor, persons with disabilities, food security and nutrition, justice for climate risk victims, and gender equality in underserved communities. WAVE has embedded its focus on the holistic growth of people and communities, with a focus on agricultural production, fisheries, the development of livestock, community-based financing, technical assistance, connections to market systems, and skill development for social and economic change. WAVE is also assisting in developing small and medium enterprises centered on agriculture and small business to generate employment possibilities for all people.

The informal sector makes up the vast majority of businesses in the nation (99.8%). Young people and women have the greatest potential in this sector. In this context, WAVE has started projects and programs that concentrate on the informal sector. These extensive and multifaceted development initiatives contribute to the country's overall economy to escape the worst forms of extreme poverty while simultaneously fostering human growth.



SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

- 254 households have engaged in different IGAs in the working areas that contributed to increase household income and improved living standard
- A total of 94 IGAs have been implementing through livestock grants during this financial year
- 7 climate adaptive technologies have been promoted for crop centric interventions that contribute to reduce production costs and benefit farmers in crop production and lead towards sustainability.
- 12 health camps and 3 eye camps have been organized in climate vulnerable communities where specialist doctors served for Gynecology, Child diseases and Adolescents crisis. It helped to reduce the treatment cost and benefit the communities.

HIGHLIGHTS

Sonia, A Dream Fighter

Sonia Begom (23) is a member of the Golap Prosperity Village Committee (PVC) in Patuakhali Sadar Union. She dropped out from secondary school and became a victim of early marriage. Since then, she has been struggling for a solvent livelihood as her husband's income cannot make their ends meet. Finding no other alternative, she fall into despair. However, meanwhile she became a beneficiary of Prosperity project and started participating PVC back in 2021. She received a 2 day training on vegetable cultivation and financial support of BDT 40,000 as loan including BDT 10,000 as donation from the project. Utilizing the financial support, she took 55 decimal land leases and started vegetable cultivation in climate vulnerable coastal area. In her first year, she has earned BDT 85000 by selling vegetables and has bought a cow with the profit. She dreams, this year she will earn BDT 1,50,000 from selling vegetables. Now, she is very happy and grateful to WAVE Foundation for her better life.



COMMUNITY FINANCING AND ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT

ENHANCE THE SOCIO-ECONOMIC CONDITION OF THE POOR AND MIDDLE-CLASS POPULATION THROUGH FINANCING AND DEVELOPING ENTREPRENEURIAL SKILLS AMONG THE POTENTIAL

WAVE's Community Finance Program has been designed to be comprehensive, approachable, and suitable for various groups of society to provide employment opportunities and promote inclusive economic growth, with a focus on the demands and requirements of the rural and urban middle class and the underprivileged groups in society. A significant number of families in the community are deprived of making these investments in the right amount and at the right time because they do not have the financial capacity and the supply of capital or credit from financial institutions in the informal sector is very low. Furthermore, without microcredit support, it is very challenging for the underprivileged and marginalized groups in society to obtain collateral-free loans. WAVE seeks to improve economic involvement and financial self-reliance, as well as outreach, coverage, and inclusion through its numerous interventions under this program.

Agripreneurship Development- This is dedicated to the sustainable development of agriculture sector of our country. In case of financing IGAs (crop cultivation, horticulture, livestock, fisheries, agro-processing, agro-mechanization etc.) in agriculture sector, WAVE offers flexibilities and has become a prominent core component of the program covering a major share (60.36%) of the yearly loan disbursement. Value-added services involve Skill Development Training, Input Supply and Technology Transfer.

Micro Enterprise and Entrepreneurship Development- WAVE has launched its Microenterprise Financing and Entrepreneurship Development Program aiming at extending financial services to the progressive members of microfinance program for undertaking IGAs that require bigger amount of capital. Apart from progressive members, WAVE provides financial services to all the entrepreneurs along with start-ups based on assessing their needs and demands. An individual micro-entrepreneur can take loan up to BDT 5.0 million for his enterprise under this Program. Value-added services involve training on Business Development, Entrepreneurship Development, Risk Management, Technology Transfer and Facilitates Market Linkage through market system inclusion. In essence, this program intends to support and uplift the aspiring entrepreneurs in their pursuit of creating self and wage based employments.








Microfinance Digitalization

WAVE has embraced a comprehensive & integrated strategy for digitalization by adopting a fully Automated System i.e. web-based, real-time loan management system (LMS) and a centralized database system of Microfinance Program.

Integrated Micro Finance Automation Suite

"Integrated Micro Finance Automation Suite" software is used in WAVE Foundation. This is a web based comprehensive solution and fully PKSF and MRA compliant. This software is used for operations such as- Member management, Savings management, Loan Management, accounts Management, Fixed Asset Management, Inventory Management, Branch/Unit Level Operations, Field collections using mobile app, Organization Level integration etc. can be performed very smoothly and efficiently. It's a total solution for the automation of Micro Finance Program. All the branches of WAVE Foundation have been using this software. A web based complete Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) solution for Asset Management, Human Resource Management, Financial management, Online Annual Performance Appraisal (APA) system and other Administrative Purposes have been developed and will be operationalized from December, 2023.

Mobile App

This is an android app for CDOs which allows microfinance loan officers to view and enter beneficiary's data on mobile phones. Beneficiary's information can be accessed off-line and data are synchronized automatically with the head office database via the internet. The application helps staff on the frontline to execute tasks with more ease and comfort.

Transaction Digitization

Introducing Digital Financial Services (DFS) and Mobile Financial Services (MFS) for both disbursement and repayment collection is a growing demand for WAVE microfinance program. Our team has explored the prospect and opportunities with bKash and Nagod and plans to develop a platform for onboarding MFS by December, 2023.

Cloud Storage Implementation

WAVE Foundation has moved to cloud storage to secure the Database, which in essence acts as a backup solution for on-premises local storage. In the event of a system failure or other hardware malfunction, files can be accessed from the cloud to restore and continue daily business operations, unhindered. Two Factor Authentication is being used to make sure the security of server from end user.

Technical Skill development initiative

For adapting to the rapid development in technology and the increased use of robust systems, it is imperative to provide technical training to the concerned officials. Hence, WAVE has taken an initiative to focus continuously on developing the technical skills of its employees through training and development efforts

Credit Information Bureau (CIB) tool for the microfinance sector

Having uniform data on borrowers is an essential first step towards mitigating credit risk and ensuring appropriate lending and repayment. Through collaboration of MRA and Bangladesh Bank, CIB for Microfinance industry as a whole has been developed in an attempt to manage & mitigate credit risk. WAVE provided information of its 5 branch offices to the authority primarily. Though still in its primary stage, online CIB system will play a vital role to enhance risk-free lending procedure in the microfinance industry once it goes live.

HIGHLIGHTS

Agri-Entrepreneurship Award 2023

WAVE has awarded successful entrepreneurs in the agricultural sector of Chuadanga district under the categories of Crop and Horticulture, Livestock, Fisheries, and Organic Fertilizer Production etc. to encourage the existing and potential agripreneurs. They are recognized for their contribution to the field of agriculture and agribusiness with greater impact on food security. The event was graced with the presence of **Honorable Executive Vice Chairman of Microcredit Regulatory Authority (MRA) Mr. Md. Fashiullah** as the Chief Guest and presided over by **Mr. Mohsin Ali, Executive Director of WAVE**. Our microfinance program consciously focuses on promoting greater representation of Marginal Farmers, Women and Young Agripreneurs in leadership positions and channeling their entrepreneurial skills by empowering them socially and economically.





Blossoming Amidst Adversity: A Tale of Empowerment through Microfinance

Kabir Howladar is a vegetable vendor in Sarulia, Demra of Dhaka city. In 2019, his wife Laiju took a loan of BDT 30.000 from WAVE Foundation and started the business. During COVID-19, livelihood had come to a halt. Kabir had to close the shop for some time, resulting in a loss of BDT 75,000. In this situation. Kabir took 2nd phase of loan from WAVE and received training on risk management and financial management and restarted the business. Currently, Kabir is earning about BDT 50,000-60,000 per month. With his current economic status, Kabir is more confident now. He has been enjoying profits and finds himself as a self-sufficient entrepreneur.





Master Crafts Person Orientation for Apprenticeship Program

35 Master crafts person received a 2-day orientation on conducting the apprenticeship program under the RAISE project, funded by the World Bank and PKSF. The program was held at the head office of WAVE Foundation. 70 Unskilled vouths got the opportunity to engage in employment by developing skills through technical training under expert Master crafts persons in different trades. The Orientation Program was inaugurated by the Honorable Executive Director Mr. Mohsin Ali.

AGRI-FOOD SYSTEM TRANSFORMATION

TRANSFORM THE AGRI-FOOD SYSTEM BY STRENGTHENING SMALL AND FAMILY FARMING APPROACHES AND DEVELOPING AGRI-ENTREPRENEURSHIP

The agri-food system is a comprehensive but complex system that includes a wide range of stakeholders in the food supply chain, and consumers as an integral part. It is influenced by the ideology of neo-liberalism has left the world in multiple crises. Therefore, WAVE has multiple interventions with various components under the livestock, crop, and fisheries. We are undertaking various projects and initiatives to transform the existing agri-food system in the conservation and development of biodiversity heritage, combating climate change, empowering farmers, nutritional security. A special emphasis has been placed on technological advancement in these sectors - crops, livestock, and fisheries. We are organizing and empowering local farmers under the umbrella of Farmers Producers' Organizations-FPOs (Krishi Morcha). WAVE is also working to promote agricultural technology to build reliable and safe markets for vegetables and other agricultural products and to empower farmers in market management to ensure their right to access markets. To support the transformation, we are engaged in the preservation of biodiversity, agriculture, the sustainable management of livestock and aquatic resources, the creation of high-value local breed mixed fish farming technologies, and the provision of immunization and medical assistance for the growth of livestock. WAVE is helping rural small farmers increase their access to real-time data by using information technologybased apps to reduce weather and climate-related risks. To make the agricultural industry more environmentally conscious, we are assisting rural farmers with pest and disease management, weather-based risk management, and crop harvesting. Overall, the program fosters support through deep connections and integration with the economic, environmental, social, and cultural processes of agriculture.

SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

- Production of safe vegetables, developing high value fruit orchard and high value crop cultivation added new dimensions in the program.
- Organization facilitated the production of 2.5 tons of onion seed for cultivating in Summer season to meet the market needs.
- Two clusters of safe vegetable production, summer watermelon and Dragon Fruit orchard have been developed in the working area covering **45**, **80** and **25** bighas of land respectively and enthused other farmers to generate better profit.
- 14 cooperatives that are independently functioning and operating businesses on agriculture product in Rajshahi District set an example of successful outcome of Value Chain project.
- Established strong networks with both the government and the private sector to access information regarding high-quality input and output markets as well as to facilitate the adoption of modern technologies.

HIGHLIGHTS

New variety: Road to onion-sufficiency

Md Abu Taleb from Shalikha, Meherpur cultivated 'BARI Onion-5' with the help of the PACE Onion project. Before he cultivated traditional crops like rice, wheat and jute in Kharif season, he was unable to make handsome amount of profit from these crops. Now he cultivates both consumable onions and onion seeds. Last year, he earned a profit of BDT 45,000 from onion cultivation and BDT 125,000 from onion seed production in one bigha of land. He also ensures income-generating opportunity of 50-60 people all the year around.



GOVERNANCE, RIGHTS AND JUSTICE

PROMOTE PEOPLE'S PARTICIPATION IN GOVERNANCE, DEMOCRATIC DECENTRALIZATION, ACCOUNTABILITY OF PUBLIC SERVICES, ECONOMIC GOVERNANCE, HUMAN RIGHTS, ACCESS TO JUSTICE, AND ABSOLUTE TOLERANCE OF DIVERSE OPINIONS IN POLITICS

WAVE is working towards strengthening the local government system and empowering the people through democratic decentralization, strengthening local government, improving the local justice system, and responsive public services. The program emphasizes the promotion of good governance through the inclusion of people's participation, especially in the decision-making process. This ensures that citizens' voices are represented in local government institutions and these institutions are sensitive, transparent, and free from corruption. Furthermore, the focus is given to training and empowering marginalized groups of society who are victims of discrimination or deprived of justice in social securityoriented services. When providing policy advice and developing campaign strategies, we take into account the public's desire to review current legal frameworks, reform them, and enact new legislation. At the same time, we place equal value on trustworthy public institutions and effective local government structures for the right to food and nutrition, health, education, agriculture services, social protection, women's rights, and gender equality. To make the local government system and its various services more accessible to the general public, several public engagement programs and campaigns have been launched. This includes mobilizing public and stakeholder views in issue-based policy advocacy and campaigns. The Right to Food and Nutrition Campaign is one of our major initiatives in Bangladesh about the transformation of the food and agricultural systems, consistent and open policy frameworks, and laws aiming at fair, inclusive, and gendersensitive good governance frameworks. Additionally, strengthening demand-driven health services, a progressive tax system to promote citizen participation, and the empowerment of underprivileged minority communities for effective participation in the development process are important initiatives.

SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

- Due to the relentless lobbying effort of Advocacy Network Committee (ANC) members, government's Asrayan Project provided housing support to the Dalit families in Tala Upazila, Satkhira.
- More than 50 CSOs, CBOs, Networks and Platforms and 90 youths from different education institutions create significant impact on progressive taxation through capacity building, campaigning and policy advocacy. A Training Module and a Training Manual on Progressive Taxation are dedicated to building capacity of local journalists and on CLA-Citizen Led Assessment respectively.
- The Department of Primary Education-DPE and education authorities are undertaking initiatives for ensuring **quality education** at Khulna and Rajshahi Division by means of respective project interventions.
- Lobby and sharing field level findings with the Cabinet Division on Social Protection Programs and Parliamentary Standing Committees of the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs persuaded the committee to make the **parliamentary oversight role** functioning and policy reforms
- As a result of the continual lobby, the orientation of initiating a functional Grievance Redress System-GRS is developed by the cabinet division
- Right to Food Bangladesh-RtF network expanded and intensified its campaign to ensure the Right to Food and nutrition security in the country and beyond. RtF BD represented in the process meeting of the Asia Pacific Social Forum.

The 'National Education Dialogue' provided a sturdy ground to illustrate the existing gaps and issues for ensuring quality education to national-level stakeholders who are directly involved in shaping national educational policies. Through this dialogue, some important recommendations resurfaced for the policymakers to improve quality education for all. This dialogue acted as a catalyst in the future for further improvisation of policies and contributed to fulfilling the Bangladesh Government's commitment to ensure SDG 4 by 2030.

Improved nutrition and health services, as well as youth participation in sports and cultural activities, are also among the projects implemented for the program. We prioritize developing youth skill sets and empowering them with leadership capabilities, life and occupational skills. Due to unemployment, a lack of motivation and frustration is observed among this large number of the youth group. It is vital to create a practical and futuristic plan for overall youth development that will allow them to tap into the potential of society. The main objective of our youth-centric activities is to provide them with the required education, knowledge, and practical skills to empower them in their socio-economic context and to advance their personal development. The projects undertaken for youth development facilitate young people to emerge as entrepreneurs, develop leadership skills, participate in climate-focused programs, and create their platforms. Overall, the program follows a holistic approach targeting crucial aspects of human life. This is a people-driven integrated development pursuit aiming at accelerating sustainable development.

SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

- A total of **100864** poor people received year-round door-step health services through **528** satellite clinics, **2095** static clinics, **3336** court-yard sessions and 35 health camps including free eye cataract operation.
- 3772 children got year-round pre-schooling and school-supportive education, among them 704 secured 1st to 10th places in GoB primary schools
- 663 elderly people received old allowances that helped them to meet their basic necessities and lead a healthy life.
- Under the leadership of 2160 mentors a total of 30640 adolescent girls and boys engaged in native culture and sports events and their social actions contribute to reducing social problems around their communities. 3499 students successfully passed through 3rd party final course assessment and 84 students shifted to mainstream government primary schools.
- Responsiveness of Local Government and Service Delivery Institutions are improved by the interventions of the **People's Alliance 'Loak Morcha'**. People's access in health, education, agriculture and Social Safety Net Program-SSNP is significantly increased.
- Youth network has been strengthened adding new young leaders and their issue-based campaigns created a vibe among their communities.
- 160 youth including 4 young professionals acquired skills in climate leadership, community-based climate action projects and they promoted climate actions on YCAP Digital (www.ycapdigital.org).

Women in Leadership Summit 2023

Women in Leadership Summit was a daylong networking/celebration event that was organized on 28th March at CIRDAP International Conference Centre, Dhaka. Through this networking event, women leaders engaged with policymakers and civil society members on 03 crucial thematic issues through a panel discussion. The event brings together representatives from the government, sector experts, development partners, academia, social activists, researchers, and enthusiasts. It became a vibrant platform of learning experiences and achievements towards women empowerment and embracing equity. A total of 147 Participants joined the summit.



CLIMATE JUSTICE AND RENEWABLE ENERGY PROMOTION

TAKE ACTIONS/INITIATIVES AND AWARENESS BUILDING AT ALL LEVELS OF THE STATE AND SOCIETY TO PREVENT CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENVIRONMENTAL DISASTERS AND INCREASE THE USE OF RENEWABLE ENERGY

We facilitate all possible means and ways to adapt and mitigate climate change effects, and nature conservation for sustainable development. As can be observed, 44% of households in the nation's disaster-prone areas have experienced more than one disaster or have been negatively impacted by one, and the cost of rebuilding and repairing crucial infrastructure or structures is increasing in poverty. We plan to have an inclusive approach to get benefits from the actions of low-carbon, climate-sensitive crop diversity, alternative food production, disaster preparedness, and emergency responses and reduced inequality in support system in using renewable energy. It is crucial to pay special attention to increasing the resilience of these communities to support their defense and capacity to withstand shocks and damages from disasters.

In an era of rapid environmental degradation and climate change, the use of renewable energybased energy instead of fossil-fuel-based energy is increasing all over the world. The main source of renewable energy in the country is biogas, which is produced using hydropower, sun, wind, and biomass. Solar home systems (SHS), is an important initiative in the development of solar energy and it has given access to electricity to a large number of people living in remote areas of the country, located outside the national grid. More than 40 lakh poor people have received electricity through home solar systems and improved their lifestyles, although its contribution to the national context is very small, only 250 MW, i.e. two percent. According to government plans, by 2021, renewable sources will provide about 10 percent of total electricity generation capacity – 2,400 megawatts. We are also partners in this process of government and are playing a complementary role in its development. We have taken up home solar systems, solar irrigation systems, advanced cooking stoves, biogas, and bio-fertilizer projects to ensure sustainable and affordable sources of energy for the people.

SIGNIFICANT CONTRIBUTION

- 134 climate migrant households and 10 entrepreneurs have increased their income up to 60% through project supported goat rearing and vermin compost.
- Resilient livelihood is promoted through adapting alternative IGAs i.e. cow rearing, hen rearing among 120 households.
- WAVE facilitated cooperative TARANGO Samaby Samittee is registered under the Department of Cooperative.
- Local leaders and youth are taking collective actions in Disaster management and **6 Union** Disaster Management Committee (UDMC) and developed contingency plans.
- **3 farmers'** groups from disaster-prone area got registration and getting govt. services that helped in increasing their production and getting fair prices.
- By offering **less expensive irrigation service** compared to diesel-based pumps, SIP provides irrigation facilities to rural off-grid areas, reducing dependency on fossil fuel and demand for electricity from the national grid.
- Reliable irrigation for sustainable agriculture and financial benefits for the marginal farmers.
- Farmers can use a solar irrigation pump to irrigate one bigha of land for **BDT 4,000** to **BDT 5,000** per year which was higher earlier.
- A total of **2.82** million kg CO2 emissions reduce for **83 solar** irrigation pumps in every year which ensures a healthy and clean environment.
- Biogas plant offers modern, risk-free, environment-friendly cooking fuel and safe agricultural production.
 Improved Cook Stove reduces 50% use of firewood that protects women and children from indoor air pollution and diseases.

HIGHLIGHTS

A delegation team has visited Renewable Energy components on the Agri voltaic Project and Grid Integration under WAVE's Solar Irrigation Project-SIP at Kulpala and Kadipur sites in Chuadanga. The team was introduced and learned details on goat farming in the fallow land of SIP creating income generation scope for marginal women and other components. During the visit, the delegation team discussed the benefits of solar irrigation projects and Solar Agri voltaic with the pump operators, farmers, and women entrepreneurs.



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NETWORK AND ALLIANCE

Right to Food Bangladesh-RtF BD is an Umbrella Network of CSOs, NGOs, INGOs, networks, peasant's, women, and indigenous organizations, social movements, researchers, academia, trade unionist, youth, small-holder farmers, and other entities working towards ensuring right to food and nutritional security. RtF BD is conducting Right to Food and Nutrition Campaign and undertaking multifaceted activities to accelerate the 'Legal Framework on Right to Food' and other relevant issues by engaging different entities with its perspectives and strategies. At present, more than thousands of national and local level organizations are engaged with this network.



Governance Advocacy Forum (GAF) is a national level platform that aims to promote democratic decentralization and local self-government through campaign and policy advocacy. GAF founded in 2007 undertaking policy advocacy for promoting strong local government. At present, the forum consists of 36 national and international NGOs, networks, local government platforms, institutions and civil society representatives working towards democratic decentralization and local self-government in Bangladesh.



People's Alliance (LoakMorcha-LM) is a non-partisan and non-communal social organization associated with the representatives from different strata of society. Constituencies of LoakMorcha include leaders and representatives of different professional associations. It is developed as a voluntary social organization in the grass root level aiming at strengthening local government, effective public service delivery and to mobilize public opinion against human rights violation. Currently, almost 80 LoakMorcha groups with more than 5000 male and female members are pro-actively involved under the banner of Loak Morcha in as grass-roots civil society organizations at the Union, Upazila and District level through different governance and local government focused projects and campaigns.

CENTER FOR DEVELOPMENT AND CAPACITY (CDC)

WAVE has been conducting Action Research for improving the quality and productivity of its products and promoting innovative ideas. To achieve this, WAVE has been working on Black Bengal Goat and Sheep breeding farm, fish culture, onion seed processing and other innovations in its own campus situated in Koshaghata village near Chuadanga district town. Besides, the program participants are provided with skills development training in the campus. From 2010, the campus is known as 'Center for Development and Capacity-CDC'. Organization is developing enterprises in the aim of sustainability of its programs. At the same time, organization is operating on firm training center in CDC.



WAVE CAPACITY DEVELOPMENT CENTERS

WAVE TRAINING CENTER, CHUADANGA

To develop human resources including staff, partners, beneficiaries and other stakeholders, WAVE Foundation has incorporated training as an integral part of all programs. It has its own training centers in Chuadanga equipped with all the necessary and modern supports including accommodation facility. Through the training centers, WAVE also offers various need-based training courses for other NGOs and non-project participants.

WAVE TRADE TRAINING CENTER, CHUADANGA

This center has been providing vocational training to youths. The objective of the training Center is to provide technical services and financial development through training so that they can earn a living.





ANGKUR CRAFTS



Angkur Crafts is an enterprise of WAVE Foundation that aims to support poor and underserved families by creating opportunities for them to become small entrepreneurs and building market linkage of their products especially crafting and clothing. Women are particularly encouraged to join this platform. It has been playing significant role for the women to achieve skills and grow as entrepreneurs. Since its inception, a significant amount of hand-stitched clothes have been produced by these women. Angkur Crafts is also working to set up a market linkage to allow the products of these small producers find buyers. At present, it has an outlet in Chuadanga district. Due to the growing interest of customers the social enterprise is expanding outreach of its products in targeted areas.



ANGKUR AGRO MACHINERIES

Extending affordable agro machineries to the farmers is the single most prerequisite to take a leap from manual to mechanization of our agriculture which can radically increase the gross agricultural production. Angkur Agro Machineries is an enterprise of WAVE Foundation that aims to complement WAVE's commitment towards the development of agriculture sector. It offers a wide range of agro machineries to the farmers. For instance, Power Tiller, Thresher, Chopper, Reaper, Harvester, Shallow Pump, Sprayer and others machineries are provided at an affordable price.

ANGKUR SEEDS

Quality Seed is the precondition for bumper Agricultural Production. ANGKUR Seeds is an initiative dedicated to the sustainable development of agricultural sector through ensuring available production, efficient processing and planned marketing of quality Crop Seeds to meet the Farmer's demand. WAVE introduced this brand in 2009 and now it is registered under the government authority. ANGKUR Seeds is also dedicated to develop capacity of farmers introducing new technologies, producing and marketing high quality onion seed (year-round) with remarkable success. A significant number of contact farmers are currently producing and marketing onion seed under this enterprise.


GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organization is headed by the Founder and Executive Director (ED) Mr. Mohsin. He leads organizational and programmatic strategic planning and operations. He has more than 40 years' experiences in the development field. ED is supported by Senior Management Team (SMT) and coordination teams formed with focal and respective staff from programs, projects, divisions, units, Capacity Development Centers and other components of organization. The Deputy Executive Director of WAVE Foundation is the second lead in the succession and responsible for operations of programs, contributing to planning and execution of strategic planning, effective communication and liaison with different entities and so on. Organization's decision making process and execution follow an accountable and transparent system through Governing body, General body, Senior Managment Team (SMT) and Coorniation Team.

GOVERNING BODY AND GENERAL BODY

WAVE Foundation has two-tiered governance system as per the organizational policy. Policies are formulated through the participation and approval of the General Body consisting of twenty two (22) members and seven (07) Governing Body of members. Governing Body reserves the highest authority in regard to policy formulation and approval as per the organizational policy. Members of Governing Body are elected for two years. Governing Body meetings are conducted at least six times a year. Executive Director is entrusted with the responsibility of proper management and implementation of policies and action plan. He acts as the Executive Director of the organization and serves as the Secretary of the Governing Body.

GOVERNING BODY



SENIOR MANAGEMENT TEAM (SMT)

SMT plays vital roles in decision-making, policy-review, evaluation, corrections and making new policy proposals. Apart from that SMT explores new horizons and works as a bridge between the organization and stakeholders. All officials functional in the directorial posts along with the Executive Director are the members of SMT. Executive Director Coordinates the SMT.

COORDINATION TEAM

The coordination team formed with focal and respective staff from programs, projects, divisions, units, Capacity Development Centers and other components of the organization. They hold regular meeting within their team and quarterly meeting headed by the Executive Director. All sorts of needs for organizational policy formulation, policy reforms, implementation strategies etc. are proposed through these coordination team meetings.



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


